
## Carol Service

These children will be lapping up as much work as possible, whether it is set in their homework book, reading, MathWhizz, spelling and times table practise or using online resources like Espresso and Topmarks to play educational games. #### KS2 Residential School Trip to How Hill (Owls and Otters Classes)

As promised, here is some information about our residential trip to How Hill that has been booked for Monday 16<sup>th</sup> March to Wednesday 18<sup>th</sup> March 2020.

The trip is offered as part of our rolling programme of trips away from home which alternate between adventurous outdoor activities (such as Horstead) and environmental studies (like the trip in March to How Hill). Both types of trip aim to broaden the children's skills and learning across the curriculum.

The cost of the trip is £130. This includes all food, at least twelve activities and two nights staying at the activity centre. It has always been run incredibly well and I know this is excellent value for money for what the children will get out of it.

I can appreciate that this is still a lot of money for parents to find, especially relatively soon after Christmas. We are more than happy to set up a payment scheme so that the cost of the trip can be paid off in instalments, if this helps. If you would like to do this, please speak to Mrs Saunders in the School Office after the holiday, who can set up a payment card with suggested dates to remind you to pay each instalment by.

When we return after Christmas, we would like to know exact numbers of children who will be going so will send out another letter asking for an initial deposit of £20.

If your child is currently receiving pupil premium, the school is prepared to pay half the cost of the trip. This is because we feel it is such a great opportunity for the children, we do not want anybody to miss out.



#### PFA Still Rocking It

They have been beavering away like mad at a range of events to raise money for the school, which we are most appreciative of. #### Walk to and from School

When speaking to some parents, they asked me to remind everybody driving to and from school to be exceptionally careful and considerate to those walking. One parent told of how they got drenched by passing cars on a rainy day as they sped past.

It is also worth noting that a few of our older children walk to school and back home on their own. Their parents obviously consider these older children sensible and safe enough to do so. However, if you are driving to school, it is better to be mindful of them and the toddlers that accompany parents to drop off and pick up. Surely it is better to lower your speed around the village just in case somebody accidentally ends up in the road where they shouldn't be.

If you find yourself late for school - and there are a few families I regularly see coming into school late - try leaving for school five or ten minutes earlier! Better to have a safe calm approach to school than one where you are rushing. This also helps your child to settle when they get here, rather than starting the day in a tiz.



# Playground Resurfacing



Thank you to everybody for your patience whilst the playground has been resurfaced. We are so pleased with the results and it is a million times better than the patchwork quilt of uneven and cracked surfaces we had before. Before the resurfacing work took place, I made sure that all the drainage underground was sorted out first. This meant lots of flushing through of pipework, repairs and replacement works. Hopefully, this will leave the school it a great position for many years to come.

After Christmas, I will be speaking to the school council to discuss the plans they have put forward for line markings and designs to go on the new surface. Unfortunately, we have to wait eight weeks before the markings can go down. This is to do with the oily resin and chemicals taking time to settle.

We have already decided to move things around a little in the playground too. This is to try to maximise the space available for the children to use. The tyres now have a new home and we will look to replace the planters that had stood for such a long time. When Mr Pells tried to move them, he found that they were rotten through. I am also trying to source a new modern bike shelter, which I want to put near the front gates, making better use of that first space on entry to the playground.

I really hope you can see how hard we are working to invest in the immediate and longer term education of the children by giving them great resources to use in school.
