The Big Little Nativity - KS1 Performance By Bethany and Lacey



As we had been learning about WWII, a gentleman named Peter (Betsy's Nan's friend) visited us and told us about his evacuee experiences. In 1939, at the outbreak of WW2, he was only 6 years old when he was evacuated, from London to Suffolk, with his Mother and his four siblings. They travelled by train, he remembered the journey in a train carriage (that did not have a corridor.) At first, his family were separated and then his mother managed to rent a property, so they could all live together again. Peter made many friends in Blo'Norton, Suffolk and returned back, as soon as possible when he got his first teaching position. He later became a headteacher. He brought with him many black and white photos to show us of his family, when they were evacuated. He

answered all of our questions - we learned a lot and were able to compare his experiences of the war with what we had learned from reading 'The Tunnel' - we all enjoyed his visit.

To mark Remembrance Day, the whole school walked to the War Memorial in Reedham, for a small service to remember those lost in both wars. Otters class also walked to Reedham Church to plant bulbs and poppy seeds. We searched amongst the headstones for War graves, we found graves of soldiers and a sailor. Each group took a rubbing of a war grave, which was put up on display in school.



As a whole class, we made a story map about the events and used success criteria. which included, adjectives, positive comparatives, positive emotions and similes; for all the things we might need to include in our own stories, he key parts of the story we needed to include: James (the main character) sees that it is snowing, he builds a snowman, goes down stairs at midnight, sees that his snowman came to life, showed him around the house, flies through the air, goes to a weird place full of snowmen. We also listened to the song from the snowman "Walking in the air." During computing, we rehearsed and videoed our own presentation of The Snowman. When it was Esmae. Eva and Cameron's turn they played their musical instruments. Eva played Walking in the Air, on her flute.

Maths

In maths, we did fractions. First, we found fractions equivalent to a unit fraction and for lots of people that was very easy. After that, we did non-unit fractions. Then we recognised equivalent fractions (we used a fraction wall to help us). We converted improper fractions to mixed numbers. We compared them, ordered fractions less than 1 and then greater than

1. We added and subtracted, with the same denominator and it was very easy. We added mixed numbers to fractions. After, we finished the maths sheet we go on maths whizz, weekly basics or TTRS (times table rock stars).

Superstar assembly



SCIENCE

This year, in science, we have been learning about evolution and inheritance. We have been learning things like: Survival of the fittest; its animals best adjusted to their environment are the most successful in surviving and reproduction.

<u>Maths</u>

In Autumn term, with Miss Waters, we covered the following topics:

- Place value of 3-digit numbers in Year 3, and
 4-digit numbers in Year 4
- Representing numbers using place value counters and on number lines
- Ordering and comparing
- Roman Numerals
- Rounding
- Addition and subtraction

With Mr Edwards, we covered the following topics:

- Shape, learning about different angles and technical vocabulary like perpendicular, vertical and horizontal.
- -Statistics, learning about how to draw pictograms, bar charts and line graphs and answer questions about the information presented.

Reading

At the end of each day, we have reading for pleasure where we read a class book. This term we have read How to Train Your Dragon and began to read Pugs of the Frozen North.

In our reading lessons with Mr Edwards on a Monday, we have focused on reading non-fiction texts.

English


This term in English lessons we have:


- Recapped KS1 grammar such as expanded noun phrases (a towering giraffe/the sparkling ocean) and verbs (is/was/swimming/swam)



- how shadows change depending how the distance between the light source and object


We also learnt about UV rays and how they can damage the retina. We even invented products to protect against damage from the sun.




In Autumn 2, we learnt about electricity. We...

- identified electrical appliances and decided whether they use mains power, batteries or a combination of both
- made simple circuits with wires, batteries, bulbs, motors and buzzers
- predicted whether a bulb would light in a circuit, then tested it
- tested different materials, including different types of metal, to see if they are conductors or insulators of electricity
- made switches to control a circuit







Computing

Our first unit was called 'Connecting Computers'. We began by developing our understanding of what digital devices are and identified input and output devices. We then compared the use of digital and non-digital devices to carry out a task by reproducing a picture of a tree using both an online paint programme and watercolours. Next, we learnt about computer networks including devices that make up a network, such as a server, wireless access points and switches. We had lots of fun pretending to be a network as you can see from the photo!





Our second computing unit was about animation. We had great fun making flip books and stop-frame motion animations using an app called **imotion** which you can download for free to use at home! To see the animations your child made in school, you can set up a parent account on Seesaw that is linked to theirs using this link

<u>PSHE</u>

Our first unit was called 'Be Yourself' and we began it by thinking of things we are proud of. We also discussed emotions and ways to deal with uncomfortable feelings such as deep breathing and doing something you enjoy. We learnt what being passive, aggressive and assertive means when you have a different opinion to someone else and we looked at and discussed the importance of questioning what you see in the media. Finally, we discussed how to make things right after making a mistake.

Our second unit was called 'TEAM'. We began the unit by discussing change and what we can do to take care of our bodies and minds when going through a change. This includes things like sharing our feelings with others, asking questions we have and talking about things we miss. We then discussed what things people do to make a team work well such as listening carefully and taking turns. Next, we discussed how to tell how people are feeling by looking at their facial expressions, body language and by what they say.

French

We began by focusing on phonics. We learnt how to pronounce the alphabet before moving onto digraphs and quadraphs such as..

We then moved onto learning shapes and instruments.

<u>Art</u>

This term, our art unit was focused on charcoal. We had great fun experimenting with charcoal in our makeshift artist's studio in the hall!















RE

Our first RE day's big questions was 'How do people express commitment to a religion/worldview in different ways?' We began the day by inviting children to talk about what activities they show commitment to outside of school. They showed certificates and medals they had earned as a result of showing commitment. We then learnt how Christians show commitment to their religion through baptism, Sikhs through an Amrit ceremony and Jews through bat/bar mitzvahs. We then compared the 3 commitment ceremonies.







Our second RE day's big question was 'What is the Trinity?' We learnt that Christianity is monotheistic which means Christians believe in one God. They do, however, view God as having 3 parts - the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. We looked for evidence of the 3 parts in piece of art, read the parable of The Prodigal Son and learnt about the Christian belief in incarnation and salvation. We discussed how these might make a difference to the way a Christian thinks about their life and how they see the world. Finally, we designed a piece of art titled 'Holy Trinity' to illustrate our understanding of what the Trinity is.

DT

We designed, made and evaluated night lights using simple circuits and switches.



History with Mr Edwards

In History, we have covered the Anglo Saxons and Maya civilisation. We looked at artefacts to help deepen our understanding of these cultures and were also able to compare these times, looking at the similarities and differences that existed between them around 700 CF.


In work on the Anglos Saxons we learned why Britain was invaded and by whom, which kingdoms were established, how they led their lives and the gods that they worshipped. We also looked at how, over about one hundred years, the Anglo Saxons went from being Pagonists to believing in Christianity.

When covering the Maya civilisation, we looked at the modern day countries this civilisation covered, the hierarchy that existed in their culture and the roles people played. We looked at some of their kings and queens and how the city states they ruled would often fight each other.


Handwriting







Heron Class - it's all about our Big, Little Adventure!

Wow! What a term we have had! Alongside all the Maths, English, Science, Geography, History, ICT, PSHE, Art, PE and RE we have learnt this term, what has truly been the highlight has been our Christmas play, The Big Little Nativity.

We started rehearsing the songs when we returned after half term - it always seems strange to be singing Christmas songs when Halloween and fireworks have barely finished but we were so glad we did. The first week of rehearsals went well. The children were beginning to learn their lines and we were having fun working out what they would be doing on stage and what props were needed. We were all enjoying learning the catchy song too. Then disaster struck in the form of chicken pox and tonsillitis! Never have I had a class struck down with illness so badly. It was 2 weeks before the performance and more than half the cast were off ill. Pressure was building but we carried on regardless, with adults filling in for the missing children. On one hand I was keeping my fingers crossed that all the children would recover from their illnesses and we would carry on as planned. But I was also strategically working out how I could put parts together or how I could have 1 child playing multiple parts. Rehearsals continued and, as usual, the children who were here amazed me with how well they were learning their lines, the songs and when to come on and off stage. But we still had a significant number of children off ill and I was beginning to worry we would have to postpone the show as there were still nowhere near enough children in school to cover the parts.

Performance week was soon upon us. After spending a very stressful weekend coming up with different plans, I was delighted to find only 5 performers were still off school ill- this we could work with! I was also delighted to find in our first rehearsal that nearly everyone knew their lines. So off we set to rehearse at the church (which is quite a long way with some little legs). When we reached the railway crossing, we phoned to cross but were told a train was approaching, so we readied ourselves to wave. We waited, and waited and waited... and nearly 20 minutes later we were greeted by the many toots of a diesel train (so I was told!) cleaning the rails. We finished our walk to the church and were greeted by Mrs Gilders and started our first church rehearsal. The walk to the church this time was filled with song, laughter and lots of photograph opportunities so it took much longer than anticipated.

We finally made it to the church and had one last photo opportunity before speedily changing into costumes (thank you to all those Otter children who helped). Backstage, nerves were aplenty and there were even a few tears but, every supportive of each other, they rallied and encouraged and everyone made it to their starting places. This was their first full performance with microphones and an audience but, with a few hiccups, which were quickly ironed out. Reflections and Looking Forward from the headteacher

What an action-packed term it has been. I am so proud of what has been achieved against the backdrop of another disjointed term's learning thanks to yet more fall out from Covid. Thinking we had finally put the huge effects of Covid to one side, we then got hit by those germs that have been waiting to strike ever since the isolation periods we had to go through. Chicken Pox, coughs and colds took their toll and it has left us with more gaps to plug in children's learning.

We have been working really hard to do just that and been adapting our curriculum to meet the needs of the children. The Reedham Read It shows how much effort goes into making your children's experiences at school enjoyable and memorable. However, that 'lost learning time' will not be replaced from just one term's worth of hard work. We need to keep striving to make improvements term on term, so that the children reach their potential and are in the right place for the next stage of their learning journey when they leave our school.

This is why, after Christmas, we really want to see a more sustained joined-up approach to home and school learning from all of our families. Too often this term, in Celebration Assemblies, it became apparent that only a small number of children read to an adult four or five days of the week. Despite incentives and rewards for those that could do it, the outcomes were still really poor and we really need to address this.

Becoming a reader unlocks life-long learning. It is the single most important thing we can help the children to achieve and the one area that parents can have a massive impact. However, if only four out of sixteen children in Owls and six out of thirty children in Otters class are reading every night to an adult, (with similar numbers in Herons) those that are not reading are massively falling behind.

Unfortunately, too many parents believe that once a child can start to sound out, blend and read with some independence, their job is done. Far from it. The next stage is even more important as that is when children need to develop their fluency, expand their vocabulary and will need support and guidance to unlock the meanings of new or unusual words. Then there is the ability to understand what you have just read. This is not just about reading the words on the page - some sense of what has been read must be demonstrated

This is why, early in the New Year we are going to have a collective push to encourage more from everyone. From the school's perspective, the children will realise the importance we are placing on to reading with increased opportunities to bury their heads in a book in different ways, in order to develop a love of reading.

From the children's perspective, we are aiming to get them to put away the tablet/ phone/ Xbox/ switch and pick up a book. There has to be a commitment from them to want to improve. Finding five minutes a day to read can have powerful results.

Most importantly, from your perspective, as a parent, we need you to encourage that commitment and be there to support your child. To help with that, there will be a 'Reading Café' as soon as we return after Christmas to tool you up with ideas and ways in which you can guide your child. Let's make 2023 the year of a commitment to learning! Chris Edwards, Headteacher
